Background

- While the social determinants of health are held as massively important to broadly understanding health, not much is known about the political determinants of health
 - In an analysis of births from 2009 to 2017, there was a significant upward shift in preterm births among US Latina women around the 2016 election
- There is a pitfall in regard to the amount of literature that discusses the detrimental impact of immigration policies on health outcomes
 - The body of literature is just as small for studies that discuss the protective health benefits for protective "sanctuary policies"

Purpose & Aims

The overarching study seeks to

- Map and describe sanctuary areas as they relate to Latinx population health variables
- Assess whether sanctuary areas are associated with protections against health disparities in Latinx populations

Aim 1

- Complete a detailed database of sanctuary policies
- Analayze the temporal, geographic, and demographic characteristics of sanctuary areas

Aim 2

 Study if sanctuary policies have protective effects on birth outcomes and health effects of Latinx individuals

Significance

- Analyzing the health consequences of immigration policies can help inform new policy
- This research can aid in better understanding the spillover effects into the communities consisting of the children of immigrant communities
- Analyses of the political determinants of health can aid in understanding how immigration policies impact those at greatest risk of detention and/or deportation

SENATE BILL 1070

AN ACT

AMENDING TITLE 11, CHAPTER 7, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BY ADDING ARTICLE 8; AMENDING TITLE 13, CHAPTER 15, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BY ADDING SECTION 13-1509; AMENDING SECTION 13-2319, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; AMENDING TITLE 13, CHAPTER 29, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BY ADDING SECTIONS 13-2928 AND 13-2929; AMENDING SECTIONS 23-212, 23-212.01, 23-214 AND 28-3511, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; AMENDING TITLE 41, CHAPTER 12, ARTICLE 2, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BY ADDING SECTION 41-1724; RELATING TO UNLAWFULLY PRESENT ALIENS.

- Arizona Senate Bill 1070:
 - Police demand "papers" and investigate immigration status if they suspect a person is undocumented.
 - Police arrest individuals without a warrant if they believe they are a deportable immigrant
 - Immigrants who fail to carry federal registration papers are guilty of a state crime.
 - Immigrants who seek or accept work without authorization are guilty of a state crime

What are Sanctuary Policies?

Policies that limit partnership between local law enforcement and federal immigration enforcement (ICE)

Philadelphia, PA 2009 Executive Order

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 8-09

POLICY CONCERNING ACCESS OF IMMIGRANTS TO CITY SERVICES

WHEREAS, immigrants make significant contributions to every facet of The City of Philadelphia's economic, educational and cultural life;

WHEREAS, immigrants are critical to the economic, cultural and social fabric of not only The City of Philadelphia, but also the greater Philadelphia region;

Section 2. Inquiries Regarding Immigration Status

A. No City officer or employee, other than law enforcement officers, shall inquire about a person's immigration status unless:

B. Law enforcement officers shall not:

- (1) stop, question, arrest or detain an individual solely because of the individual's ethnicity, national origin, or perceived immigration status;
- (2) inquire about a person's immigration status, unless the status itself is a necessary predicate of a crime the officer is investigating or unless the status is relevant to identification of a person who is suspected of committing a crime (other than mere status as an undocumented alien);
- (3) inquire about the immigration status of crime victims, witnesses, or others who call or approach the police seeking help; or
 - (4) inquire regarding immigration status for the purpose of enforcing

Study Design & Analysis

- We created a sanctuary policy dataset and coded descriptive policy characteristics.
 - These characteristics were determined by qualitative thematic analysis resulting in the creation of a codebook
- Descriptive Statistical Analysis
 - Created 7 main themes, which were identified by policy rationales and types attained from a prior study(Lasch et al).
 - Keywords and phrases related to health and wellbeing were identified and coded


Study Design & Data

Policy Themes/Rationales (Lasch, et al)

- The conviction that localities (and not the federal government) should control their own criminal justice priorities and resources
- A desire to avoid unlawful arrests and detentions
- The concern that entangling police with immigration enforcement erodes trust among minority community members
- 4 commitment to preventing improper discrimination in policing based on race, ethnicity or national origin
- A desire to further diversity and inclusion
- A wish to express disagreement with federal immigration policy

Policy Themes/Types (Lasch, et al)

- Barring investigation of civil and criminal immigration violations by local law enforcement
- 2 Limiting compliance with immigration detainers and immigration warrants
- Refusing U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement ("ICE") access to local jails
- Limiting local law enforcement's disclosure of sensitive information
- Precluding local participation in joint operations with federal immigration enforcement.







2008 - Secure Communities Federal Prograrm

2011 -Expansion of Secure Communities

2014 -Two federal cases of erroneous ICE detainers won by Latinx individuals

2017 - Trump's 100-day plan, Restart SC, Anti-immigration executive orders

Next Steps

- Study if sanctuary policies have protective effects on birth outcomes and health effects of Latinx individuals
- Review data from the Pew Research Center, more specifically the National Survey of Latinos, to understand how health outcomes may be related or unrelated to health
- Examine the correlation between birth outcomes and areas protected by specific sanctuary policies

Lessons Learned

- Analyses of health must include social, political, and economic lenses
- Articulating policy and data in layterms
- Use of Codebook Code big, then go small
